Overview of Program

Why Choose the College Academy at HSHS?

The HSHS College Academy is a unique program for Mustang families. For students, it serves as a springboard to college success by providing college-going skills and a supported college experience that saves families money by reducing university tuition as well as housing and living expenses. Benefits may include:

- Earn high school and college credit at the same time
- Earn Core Complete Certificate by completing 42+ hours of college coursework before graduation
- Save on tuition and housing
- Priority in Course Selection while in high school

Academy scholars will have an opportunity to begin taking college courses in the spring semester of their freshman year. Online college class periods can be built into the high school schedule for students to complete online college coursework with an in-house teaching assistant available. Other delivery formats may be available as well. Although students are ultimately responsible for managing their personal Academy experience, an Academy Facilitator will support and assist students in their management of online college coursework.

In addition, selected applicants in grades 9 or 10 will participate in an Academy Seminar that focuses on developing college-readiness skills and test prep for passing the TSIA ELAR/Writing. (see also Expectations and Commitments)

Candidate Eligibility

The Academy is best suited for high-achieving students who have a college and career plan. Only students with evidence of commitment to high achievement will be eligible to apply for admission (see also Admission Criteria).

Incoming HSHS students and eligible new ninth grade students may apply for the Academy prior to entering the freshmen/sophomore year. Approximately twenty students will be accepted based on pre-determined criteria. Other students may continue to take college coursework through dual credit as eligible and desired.

College Academy Admissions Process

Admission Criteria

In spring of 8th/9th grade year or upon enrollment at Hughes Springs:

 Complete Admission Application can be found online at www.hsisd.net/page/College_Academy.

Approximately, twenty scholars will be selected to begin the Academy by enrolling in the Academy Seminar course using the following criteria:

- 8th or 9th grade GPA, with a minimum weighted GPA of 3.0
- Most recent STAAR scores-met all standards with mastery* in at least one area
- Completed Application by Deadline
- Writing Prompt on Application

Students who complete the Academy Seminar during freshman or sophomore year must meet the following requirements to enroll in college coursework:

- Have a 3.0 weighted GPA from high school work completed
- Demonstrate college readiness by meeting the ELAR and Writing Texas Success Initiative Assessment (TSIA) minimum score requirements or meeting minimum score requirements on ACT or SAT
- Complete the Dual Credit application for Northeast Texas Community College
- Complete Dual Credit Registration by Deadline

Current high school students:

Students not selected to begin the Academy in their freshman year may apply again in the sophomore year as space becomes available. However, applicants must enroll in the Academy Seminar during the sophomore year to prepare for college coursework and meet all other eligibility requirements (as listed above).

Students in grades 11 and 12, not selected for the College Academy, may enroll in dual credit courses under the academic handbook guidelines.

^{*}Due to testing release, students entering College Academy 2023-2024 are not held to mastery in one area but must qualify for at least two high school honor courses.

Expectations and Policies for Academy Scholars

Requirements to Continue in Program

- Academy Scholars will follow the Foundation + Distinguished graduation plan.
- Complete the Academy Seminar course with a grade of 95 or higher.
- Scholars are enrolled in college courses, and for the purposes of dual credit coursework will be treated as college students. **Students receive no special privileges or exceptions** because they are also high school students.
- Any scholar earning a final grade of C in a college course will be placed on Academic Probation by the College Academy Program. After earning an additional C or lower grade, the student will no longer be eligible to participate in the College Academy. (A senior may appeal if a grade of C is earned in a higher level class.)
- Any scholar who earns a D or lower in a college course will no longer be eligible to participate in the College Academy. (If the course is retaken with a course grade of B or better, at the student's expense, the student may be re-instated to College Academy.)
- Students who drop a course after the twelfth class day will be placed on Academic Probation. Any future dropped courses or final grades of C or lower will result in removal from the College Academy. If a dropped course is funded by a scholarship, the student is responsible for repaying any portion of the tuition not refunded by the college.
- Any instances of academic dishonesty, including collusion and plagiarism, will result in immediate dismissal from the College Academy. Students will be ineligible for all associated benefits including scholarships and reimbursements.
- Scholars who are a continual disruption to learning will no longer be eligible to participate in the College Academy.
- Expressed deadlines are not arbitrary and are expected to be met. Missing a deadline may mean loss of eligibility in the Academy.
- While not required, internet access at home is highly recommended since most courses are taken online. This allows students to access the course after school hours.

Other Commitments

Academy scholars will be expected to participate in programs and activities designed to sustain the program as well as build character and leadership. Some of these activities include but are not limited to participation in scholarship fundraisers and presentations to community partners.

Exam Proctoring

Some college exams are required to be proctored by the College Academy facilitator or other designated HSHS staff. Proctoring procedures are as follows:

- Exams for which the course instructor requires proctoring may be proctored at HSHS
 upon instructor approval. The student is responsible for contacting the instructor to
 request permission and for making proctoring arrangements with the Academy
 facilitator.
- Proctoring may also be required by HSHS even if the course instructor does not require
 it. In these circumstances, arrangements will be made for the students to test during
 school hours.
- Proctoring software required by professors may need special approval from HSISD Tech to download on a school device. Scholars should plan accordingly.

Academy Seminar

The objectives of the Academy Seminar are to

- ☑ Set goals regarding academic, career, social, and personal success
- ☑ Make healthy decisions and adjustments while transitioning to high school
- ☑ Identify strengths/weaknesses in terms of note-taking and study habits, time management, and test taking skills and make adjustments
- ☑ Learn how to conduct scholarly research and create proper citations
- ☑ Provide scholars with the knowledge to become ethical academic achievers
- ☑ Provide scholars with test taking strategies and material for scoring college ready on the TSIA-ELAR and Writing.

CORE COMPLETE/Dual Credit Program

Completing all NTCC's required core courses earns a certification as "Core Complete", which transfers as a core block to any Texas public college. However, the receiving college may have additional requirements that students must meet in order to complete their required Core. See the Iransferring Tips at THECB's site, College for All Texans, for more information regarding the Core Curriculum and transferring.

Course Selection and Grading Policies

- Students and families bear 100% of the responsibility for determining transferability of coursework. It is not advisable to rely on hearsay from others. Instead,

 - For out-of-state and private colleges, please contact the institution directly.
- Students and families bear **100% of the responsibility for determining the need of coursework** for a specific degree plan. *It is not advisable to rely on hearsay from others.*Degree plans can be found on college websites or by contacting the institution directly.
- Grades and attendance are determined by the college. HSHS only represents the location at which students are taking college courses. The ownership of all college courses belongs to the college.
- Numeric grades will be posted to the high school transcript when made available by the
 college. For college courses that receive additional grade points for GPA calculation,
 numeric grades will be posted on the transcript.
- College courses will only count in the **calculation of GPA** for courses satisfying high school requirements if pre-approval, given by the registration deadline, is granted by the principal, counselor, or College Academy facilitator, and the credit is not already satisfied by a high school course. Special considerations may be made for students seeking to enroll in higher-level college coursework. (Courses not pre-approved by the appropriate school personnel by the stated deadline will not be counted as dual credit nor awarded online class period(s) or early release. The student is responsible for obtaining approval by the deadline.)

Scholars wanting to complete an associate degree should work closely with NTCC advisors and the advisors of the entering college or university to make sure the degree will transfer. At least 60 hours must be completed to achieve an associate degree, which will include extra hours per semester and typically summer classes on top of the above-mentioned core plan.

Scholarships & Reimbursements

Tuition assistance is available from HSISD and NTCC through need-based scholarships and reimbursements. HSISD also provides need-based scholarships for textbook/resources for eligible students. There are five opportunities to receive assistance:

O NTCC provides a limited number of need-based institutional scholarship awards. This scholarship will pay \$210 per semester during the fall and spring semesters. This scholarship can be used to assist with tuition for any college course. The NTCC Dual Credit Scholarship application can be found at ntcc.edu or from the dual credit facilitator.

OHSHS provides a limited number of need-based scholarship awards. The HSHS College Academy Scholarship will pay \$210 per semester during the fall and spring semesters. This scholarship can be used to assist with tuition for any college course; however, priority will be given to the students who are completing courses that are weighted for the calculation of GPA. The HSHS College Academy Scholarship application is available on the school website.

OHSHS offers reimbursement for courses that are included for GPA calculation and not funded by scholarships. For current HSHS juniors and seniors, one reimbursement per semester can apply for PRE-APPROVED required courses which are included in calculation of GPA and taken during the junior or senior year. Reimbursements are considered by the counselor and principal and are limited to funding available. An "A" in the course will result in a 100% reimbursement. A "B" in the course will result in a 50% reimbursement. A grade lower than a "B" will result in no reimbursement. The tuition reimbursement application is available on the school website and should be submitted the semester the course is completed.

OThe NTCC Work Scholarship Program provides students a way to earn tuition money by working for the college in advance of taking courses. The program allows a student to earn \$12 an hour in a 16-hour a week pay period. Four dollars of that \$12 goes into the student's pocket, which equals \$64 per week, leaving the other \$8 an hour going into an account set aside for the student's future tuition and fees. If interested in working for tuition, please contact NTCC for more information.

OHSHS offers assistance with textbooks for students who are unable to purchase textbooks due to financial need. Requests for help may be made by contacting the College Academy facilitator *prior to the beginning of a course*. Limited scholarships for this purpose are available on a first-come, first served basis. No scholarships are available after the course has begun.
